Navigating Summer Melt

The summer before enrolling in college is a critical time for your student. Use the following tips to help navigate summer melt.



Monitor Your College Finances

Sometimes, a student is unable to fully enroll if there are missing financial documents, unaccepted aid, or if a balance is owed. Your student should monitor the following:

- Check the status of financial aid
- Check balances or set up a tuition payment plan
- Check health insurance plans
- Ask about tuition waiver eligibility (if applicable)
- Meet with your vocational rehabilitation (VR) counselor (if applicable)



Set Up a Support System

Creating a support system early on can have a positive impact on the transition to and success of your student's postsecondary journey. Encourage your student to identify the appropriate points of contact that can serve as mentors in addition to their counselor.

- Talk to mentors
- Contact a school counselor over the summer
- Contact the office of disability services and get to know your adviser (if applicable)



Submit Any Additional Documentation

Have your student consistently monitor their portal for any follow-up action items requested by the office of admission

- Check the college portal
- Complete placement testing before orientation
- Submit any accommodations paperwork



Set Up Housing

Connecting with their roommate can help motivate your student for the fall. They can also begin a list of needed essential items.

- Verify that housing is confirmed
- Connect with roommate(s)



Prepare for Leaving Home

Leaving home is the hardest part, but working through the items listed above can help ease the stress. The more prepared your student can be, the more excited they will become.

- Attend college orientation
- Gather school and dorm supplies

Preparing for a Military Career in High School



Students who graduate with an endorsement must complete a coherent series of courses to satisfy that endorsement's requirements. Typically, this means taking four classes (or earning four credits) related to an endorsement area. Each of the five endorsement options can offer a way for your student to earn the skills and knowledge needed to prepare for a military career that interests them. Just keep in mind that not every military branch offers the same career opportunities.

Financial Aid Term	Definition
Financial Aid Office	The financial aid office at a college or university is responsible for helping students afford their college tuition. They are also usually in charge of actually disbursing aid to students. If you ever have any specific financial aid questions, it's always best to reach out directly to a college's financial aid office for their institution's answers.
Cost of Attendance (COA)	A college's COA tells you how much money it will cost your student to attend that school in a given year. Not only does this figure include tuition, it also covers other necessary expenses, such as transportation and room and board.
Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)	The Free Application for Federal Student Aid, commonly known as the FAFSA, is a financial aid application that students must complete before applying for virtually all forms of financial aid. Students who plan on attending college after high school will need to complete the application during the fall of their senior year. They'll

Have a senior? Starting this school year, **all students must submit a financial aid application to graduate**. Every year, **billions of financial aid dollars go unclaimed**. And in Texas, students miss out on roughly \$300 million in grants (free money) each year by simply not enrolling in college. Texas' new graduation requirement gives students an extra push to get these funds and pursue education or training after high school.

Families play an important role in the financial aid process. Not only do students benefit from motivation at home, but many students will need to report parental information on their application.

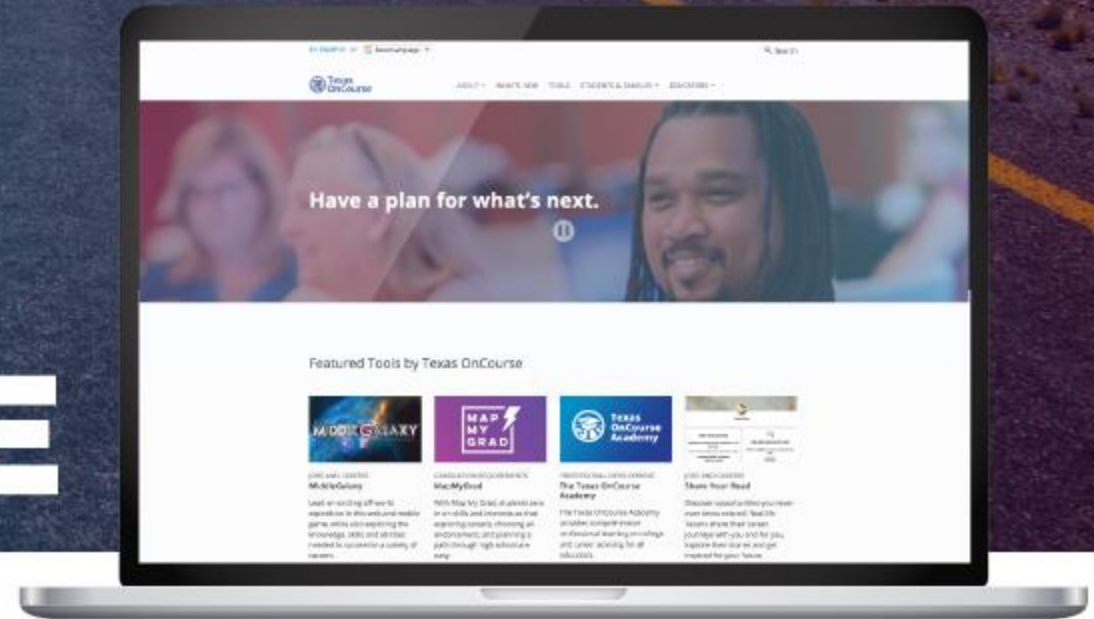
