To understand your curiosity persona, complete the self-assessments below by ticking one of the two statements that best describes your personal curiosity preferences.

Once you've completed all of the statements, add together the total number of ticks in each column and write the totals in the bottom rows.

To identify your curiosity persona, transfer your scores onto the persona key grid:

- 1. Use your higher score in the Ideas/People section to plot where you fall on the vertical axis.
- 2. Use your higher score from the Depth/Breadth section to plot where you fall on the horizontal axis.
- 3. The intersection of those two points will indicate which quadrant you fall into. For instance, if you were a 7 on Ideas and a 7 on Depth, you are an 'expert'.
